### LOCAL CONTROL AND ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN

#### Content and Structure of the Plan

The Office of Education's Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) and annual updates shall adhere to the template provided by the State Board of Education (SBE) and shall include, for each of the Office of Education's Court and Community Schools:

- 1. A description of the annual goals to be achieved for all students and for each numerically significant subgroup for each of the following state priorities as applicable to the students served:
  - a. The degree to which teachers are appropriately assigned in accordance with Education Code 44258.9 and fully credentialed in the subject areas and for the students they are teaching; every student has sufficient access to standards-aligned instructional materials as determined pursuant to Education Code 60119; and school facilities are maintained in good repair as specified in Education Code 17002
  - b. Implementation of the academic content and performance standards adopted by the State Board of Education (SBE), including how the programs and services will enable English learners to access the Common Core State Standards and the English language development standards for purposes of gaining academic content knowledge and English language proficiency
  - c. Parent/guardian involvement, including efforts the Office of Education makes to seek parent/guardian input in school site and COE program decision making and how the Office will promote parent/guardian participation in programs for unduplicated students and students with disabilities.
  - d. Student achievement, as measured by all of the following as applicable:
    - i. Statewide assessments of student achievement
    - ii. The percentage of students who have successfully completed courses that satisfy the requirements for entrance to the University of California and the California State University, or career technical education sequences or programs of study that satisfy specified requirements and align with SBE-approved career technical education standards and frameworks, including, but not limited to, those described in Education Code 52302, 52372.5, or 54692; and have successfully completed both college entrance courses and CTE sequences or programs.

- iii. The percentage of English learners who make progress toward English proficiency as measured by the SBE-certified assessment of English proficiency
- iv. The English learner reclassification rate
- v. The percentage of students who have passed an advanced placement examination with a score of 3 or higher
- vi. The percentage of students who participate in and demonstrate college preparedness in the Early Assessment Program pursuant to Education Code 99300-99301
- e. Student engagement, as measured by school attendance rates, chronic absenteeism rates, middle school dropout rates, high school dropout rates, and high school graduation rates, as applicable
- f. School climate, as measured by student suspension and expulsion rates and other local measures, including surveys of students, parents/guardians, and teachers on the sense of safety and school connectedness, as applicable
- g. The extent to which students have access to and are enrolled in a broad course of study that includes all of the subject areas described in Education Code 51210 and 51220, as applicable, including the programs and services developed and provided to unduplicated students and students with disabilities, and the programs and services that are provided to benefit these students as a result of supplemental and concentration grant funding pursuant to Education Code 42238.02 and 42238.03
- h. Student outcomes, if available, in the subject areas described in Education Code 51210 and 51220, as applicable
- i. How the County Superintendent will coordinate instruction of expelled students offered pursuant to Education Code 48926
- j. How the County Superintendent will coordinate services for foster youth, including, but not limited to, all of the following:
  - i. Working with the county child welfare agency to minimize changes in school placement
  - ii. Providing education-related information to the county child welfare agency to assist the agency in the delivery of services to foster youth, including, but not limited to, educational status and

- progress information that is required to be included in court reports
- iii. Responding to requests from the juvenile court for information and working with the juvenile court to ensure the delivery and coordination of necessary educational services
- iv. Establishing a mechanism for the efficient and expeditious transfer of health and education records and the health and education passport
- 2. Any goals identified for any local priorities established by the Board.
- 3. A description of the specific actions the Office of Education will take during each year of the LCAP to achieve the identified goals, including the enumeration of any specific actions necessary for that year to correct any deficiencies in regard to the state and local priorities specified in items #1-2 above. Such actions shall not supersede provisions of existing collective bargaining agreements within the Office of Education.

For purposes of the descriptions required by items #1-3 above, the Board may consider qualitative information, including, but not limited to, findings that result from any school quality reviews conducted pursuant to Education Code 52052 or any other reviews. For any local priorities addressed in the LCAP, the Board and Superintendent or designee shall identify the method for measuring progress toward achieving those goals.

To the extent practicable, data reported in the LCAP shall be reported in a manner consistent with how information is reported on the California School Dashboard.

# Increase or Improvement in Services for Unduplicated Students

The LCAP shall demonstrate the applicable level of increased or improved services to unduplicated students. The LCAP shall explain how the funding apportioned based on the number and concentration of unduplicated students is used and how services are provided, whether by school site or countywide, to meet the needs of unduplicated students and to improve the performance of all students in the state priority areas. (5 CCR 15494, 15496)

Services that may be considered for this purpose include, but are not limited to, those associated with the delivery of instruction, administration, facilities, student support services, technology, and other general infrastructure necessary to operate and deliver educational instruction and related services. (5 CCR 15495)

## Administrative Regulation 0460(d)

### Governance

When supplemental and/or concentration grant funds are to be expended on a countywide basis, the LCAP shall identify the services being funded and describe how they are principally directed towards, and effective in, meeting the COE's goals for unduplicated students in the state and local priority areas, as applicable. (5 CCR 15496)

## Availability of the Plan

The Superintendent or designee shall post the LCAP, any updates or revisions to the LCAP, and the LCFF budget overview for parents/guardians on the homepage of the Office of Education web site.
